AVID: College and Career readiness for all students

AVID provides classroom activities, teaching practices, and academic behaviors that can be incorporated into any classroom to improve engagement and success for all students.

In All Content Areas

 AVID strategies are seen in all content area classes in Fox Lane Middle School. All teachers have access to <u>avid.org</u> where they can find resources from introductory relational capacity activities to strategies for deepening content literacy.

In the AVID Elective Class

A stand-alone class period for 7th and 8th grade students where they
focus on building key academic skills for future success.



Advancement Via Individual Determination Grades 7-8

AVID is a national nonprofit whose mission is to close the opportunity gap. They partner with schools to equip teachers with resources and training around key academic skills and social supports so that all students can be college and career ready.

Students who are a good fit

- Achieve academically average performance
- Demonstrate potential for acceptance into and success in postsecondary education
- Are motivated and eager to achieve
- Show potential to become, or already are, active, positive members of school community
- May come from family where parents do not have college education/do not possess access to resources about the college process

Scheduling

The AVID class is part of students' daily schedule.

Entrance Criteria

Cohort is selected for the AVID program through a school recommendation process for grades 7-8, with the opportunity to continue in grades 9-12 at FLHS.

- Interview with guidance counselor
- Recommended by their teams

Exit Criteria

- Meeting class requirements can be counseled out.
- Maintain at least a C average
- Student and/or family does not feel AVID is meeting needs



AVID Strategies and Professional Development



WICOR (Writing, Inquiry, Collaboration, Organization, Reading)

Relational Capacity: Name Tents, Words With Friends, Tennis Ball Activity

Content Literacy: Marking The Text, One-Pager, The Proficient Reader

Vocabulary: Frayer Model, Concept Map, Extended Paragraph







Executive Functioning

The phrase "executive function" refers to a set of skills. These skills underlie the capacity to plan ahead and meet goals, display self-control, follow multiple-step directions even when interrupted, and stay focused despite distractions, among others.




Executive Functioning in FLMS



Where is Executive Functioning in FLMS?

- All Content Areas
 - Through Instructional Council, members turnkey skills and classroom procedures to their academic and grade level teams.
- Homebase
 - Teachers have a menu of options that students can work though in order to improve skills such as organization, planning and prioritization, and task initiation.
- What I Need (WIN)
 - Students are recommended to the class by their academic team.
- After School Academy
 - o 6th Grade students are recommended to the program by their House team.







What you can do:

- Set academic goals for yourself.
- Have an academic conversation with your Homebase teacher(s).
- Check StudentVue for missing/late assignments.
- Send e-mails to your teachers.
- Organize your materials (binders, notebooks).
- Use an agenda to write down assignments, tests/quizzes, projects.
- Conduct a collaborative study group to review class notes or study for a quiz/test.
- Ask your peers for any notes or classwork you may be missing.
- Create a plan for after school activities (clubs, sports, music, HW).

WIN (What I Need) - formerly Academic Support Center

WIN is a class that provides students with support in assignment completion, organizational skills, and time-management. This class is led by an IA. Students do not receive a grade for WIN. Classes are limited to approximately 10 students max.

Students who are a good fit

- Benefit from dedicated time to work quietly in school
- Need support with organization
- Require assistance with time-management
- May have limited access to academic support outside of school

Scheduling

The class, which meets every other day, is scheduled so that students miss a special (gym, art, music) every other day, attending specials on alternate days.

Entrance Criteria - Intake Form

Students are recommended by their team. It is a fluid model, so students can begin and exit WIN at any time.

- Student not meeting classroom standards
- Student not passing tests/quizzes

Exit Criteria

- Improved classroom performance
- Passing tests/quizzes
- Meets intervention goal shown through common formative assessments

It is available two days per week after school until 4pm.

Entrance & Exit Criteria -

Students are selected based on need and recommendation.

After-School Academy Nomination Form

We are offering this program between the hours of 2:30pm-4:00pm on Monday's and Wednesday's.

Students attending are welcome to attend their teachers' after school help program on Mondays first, they are then expected to return to the LMC until 4:00pm.

Official Description:

Student Selection:


