The Bedford Central School District serves the towns of Bedford Village, Bedford Hills, Mount Kisco, Pound Ridge, and parts of New Castle and North Castle. The District is comprised of one high school, one middle school and five elementary schools located throughout the community.

The Board of Education meets on Wednesday evenings, approximately twice monthly except during March, when they meet weekly to discuss and finalize the following school year's budget; the schedule of Board meetings is posted on our website.

The Board of Education meetings are broadcast live on the website and on BCSD TV (FIOS Channel 1982 and Cablevision Channel 18). Presentations from the Board meetings are posted on our website including the annual State of the District Report, State of Operations Report, State of the Curriculum Report, and Performance Report, in addition to other departmental and informational reports.

Throughout the school year, we produce "The Buzz," a brief video about timely topics. Other Bedford produced programs, athletic events, and presentations may be viewed any time on our website through the video on demand module.


The Board of Education and Dr. Hochman encourage and engage in open communication with the members of the community on all aspects of District operations. A District newsletter (in print and online) is published approximately three times per year and is mailed to all households in the community; a subscription email newsletter, *eNews*, is sent out weekly; and our community advisory committees meet throughout the year. Partnering with our community members is a high priority for the Board of Education and Administration; public engagement sessions, and telephone and on-line surveys are used as another means to that end. Dr. Hochman meets throughout the year with many outside community organizations and groups - all in an effort to obtain feedback and input on short term and long term planning.

Department Information

The Business Office is responsible for all of the business and related administrative services of the District. The scope of responsibility covers all aspects of accounting, auditing, budget development and management, money management and investments, facilities use, payroll and payroll compliance, purchasing, risk management and insurance needs. In addition, the Assistant Superintendent is responsible for overseeing the operations for transportation, buildings and grounds, and the District's food service program. The department as a whole works diligently to ensure that all procedures are in complete compliance with all State and Federal laws in addition to Board of Education policies. The staff manages and invests over \$100 million annually and ensures the safeguarding of the District's funds while striving for a competitive rate of return. They manage a General Fund budget of \$126.5 million, Federal, State and Local Grant Program budgets of about \$3.5 million, and a School Lunch Program budget of \$1.5 million. Payroll is processed for an estimated 900 full and part-time employees every two weeks. All health, dental and life insurance benefits for over 1,110 participants are managed and processed as well. The accounts payable department audits and processes an estimated 5,800 checks a year. The Purchasing Agent manages and monitors a database of over 5,000 different vendors and approves an estimated 3,600 purchase orders a year. Materials and supplies are purchased through New York State authorized contract vendors in addition to several cooperative purchasing programs. A very busy department!

Department Information

The Buildings and Grounds Department is responsible for the repair, maintenance and minor construction of 800,000 square feet of building space and the maintenance of over 273 acres of property which includes 32 acres of playgrounds and athletic fields. The department is also responsible for the repair and maintenance of the environmental systems (water, wastewater) and all of the snow plowing and snow removal across the District. Our buildings are cleaned, maintained and operated by a custodial staff consisting of seven Head Custodians, two Night Captains (HS, MS), 30 Custodians, one Maintenance Foreman, three Maintenance Mechanics, one Grounds Foreman, two Groundsmen, one District Courier and one Account Clerk. The department is responsible for its own accounts payables, capital project finances, capital project bidding, special projects and district-wide courier services. Tom Briggs has over 34 years of experience in construction, operations, and maintenance and is a member of the New York State School Facilities Association.

Department Information

The Bedford Central School District transports approximately 5,000 students to and from school each day. We contract our transportation services to Towne Bus whose bus drivers are all highly qualified, licensed and trained to perform his or her duties to the absolute best of his or her ability. It is the role of our transportation professionals to ensure that all the elements of a safe and efficient school bus ride are met at all times. The transportation department is responsible for the operation of 80 regular route school buses daily covering 59 square miles transporting both public and non-public school students. We service eight indistrict public school locations, three in-district private school locations, 34 out-of-district non-public schools, and nine out-of-district special education programs logging approximately 1.2 million miles per year. Computerized mapping software is used to keep track of the students and the routes. This information is available at the individual schools for their informational needs.

Our District policy allows for the provision of transportation services for all resident students living more than one-half mile from their school. For those students who attend a private school, parents must file a written request for transportation with the transportation department by April 1st of the preceding school year or within 30 days of establishing residency in the school district.

Department Overview

This office is responsible for the PreK-12 instructional program and for the coordination of professional development to provide continuous education and instructional support to the District's professional staff. Examples of the work of this office include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Development and implementation of the District's curriculum review cycle for all academic disciplines, including periodic program review and evaluation, curriculum revision, and program selection
- Articulation of the elementary, middle, and high school instructional programs and coordination of instructional and curricular support to administrative staff and classroom teachers
- Preparation and analysis of the annual Student Performance Report to inform decision making
- Management of state and federal grants, coordination of all program improvement projects and professional development activities including conference attendance and consultancies
- Administration and analysis of national, state, and district assessments
- Planning and coordination of a variety of innovative programs to deepen, enrich, accelerate and maximize student learning during and beyond the school day and year



2015-2016 Projects and Initiatives

Our work as a District is organized into several major categories, many of which intersect with curriculum and instruction. Our 2015-16 projects and initiatives are organized and described according to these categories below. For more detail, please visit our website at www.bcsdny.org/curriculum.

Every Student: Learning, Equity and Access

- We have moved into year four of the AVID program, adding new eighth and ninth grade cohorts to our continuing
 group, now extending through grade twelve. AVID, Advancement through Individual Determination, targets capable,
 but under-performing students and supports them with skills, strategies and supports to access the highest levels of
 coursework and begins the college planning process early.
- With several years of implementation of both *Response to Intervention* (RTI) and the Common Core Learning Standards, this year it is time to step back and gauge our progress, and where we need to retool and revisit our practices and approaches. In partnership with the Special Education Department, we will be conducting a self-evaluation and process review with an eye toward strengthening core instruction in all classrooms, and progressively intense supports for students in need. This will involve the RTI teams in every building along with the District RTI Steering Committee.

Academic Repertoire and Practice

- Continuing our implementation of the <u>Common Core Learning Standards</u>, we are entering the fourth year of our K-5 math program, *Math in Focus*, making this the very first group of third graders that has been exposed to this program and these standards all the way through their schooling. At the high school level, this marks the final year of phasing in Common Core math courses with the changes to Algebra 2. We are also focusing intensely on writing this year, having undertaken significant revisions to our writing units K-5, and writing portfolio in middle and high school. We are emphasizing both a greater quantity of writing, and a stronger and better articulate continuum of writing practice K-12. Please visit our website for more information.
- Assessing student learning is an important level for improvement, and BCSD is again participating in two assessment projects-the PNW BOCES *Teaching is The Core* Grant Consortium and the Tri-States *Performance Assessment Design Initiative*, both of which support our teachers to develop capacity for learner-centered practices in assessment. During these projects, educators will design, review and implement new performance-based assessments that more authentically engage students *in* learning while providing information *about* their learning.

Teaching English to and School Success for Speakers of Other Languages


Building on the understanding that all students are potential emergent bilinguals, we will be working to implement the State's new Part 154 regulations that raise the expectations for how we instruct students learning English as a new language. Along these lines, we will build on our tremendously successful first year of dual language bilingual education at Mount Kisco Elementary School by introducing the program in second grade. This two-way language program engages students enrolled to learn in English and Spanish in each of their core academic subjects with the goals of high academic achievement, biliteracy, and biculturalism.

Professional Learning and Practice

- It has been two years since external evaluators, or critical friends, spent time reviewing our World Language program, and our use of time across all aspects of our work. As a result, we will be hosting a return visit on each topic in the spring to provide an update and to get further guidance.
- We are excited to continue to develop and deepen our Professional Development School relationship with Manhattanville College. With six schools now involved--Fox Lane Middle School, Bedford Village, Mount Kisco, Bedford Hills, Pound Ridge, and West Patent elementary schools, we aim to leverage our pledge to deepen our commitment to the goals of the PDS, which are to improve student learning, prepare pre-service teachers for the profession, provide professional learning for our current teachers, and engage in research and inquiry into improving practice.

Department Overview

Serving a dynamic population, the Department of English to Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) aims to promote the academic excellence, creativity, and wellness of English language learners (ELLs). Specifically, the Department endeavors to advance district efforts to eliminate the achievement gap among students of culturally, ethnically, and linguistically diverse backgrounds. Often students come from homes where another language is spoken; many newcomers enter the US speaking little or no English. We aspire to provide ELLs an education that ensures they will be college-ready and to engage all language minority students in their own academic achievement. In fact, approximately 50 students in the Fox Lane High School Class of 2015 were identified as English language learners when they entered school.

ESOL teachers and bilingual elementary teachers provide explicit instruction in listening, speaking, reading, and writing while building academic language so that ELLs have increased access to meaningful grade-level content. At all grade levels, ESOL teachers provide intensive, small-group instruction to beginning and intermediate ELLs during the literacy block. In every grade, ELLs at all levels of English proficiency participate in mainstream classes across the content area; often ESOL faculty collaborate with classroom teachers to maximize ELLs access to grade-level material as students develop their language skills. In every building, ESOL teachers collaborate with faculty, staff, and clinicians to ensure the social and emotional wellness of ELLs so that they are integrated into the school community.

Across the district, over 540 identified ELLs speak one of more than 15 different home languages. Under the direction of the Office of Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment, the Department collaborates with the Bedford Staff Development Center to allocate Title III funding to provide high-quality professional development and rich learning experiences for ELLs and their families. In an effort to serve the growing number of Spanish-speaking ELLs, the district currently provides bilingual instruction in the early primary grades.

Department Overview (continued)

In the enhanced kindergarten bilingual program at MKES, classroom teachers provide literacy instruction to students in their home language, and all students participate in Spanish LOTE enrichment. In the Two-Way Dual Language Bilingual Education Program, participating students receive all academic instruction in English and Spanish in a two-day cycle.

In 2014, NYSED introduced a new assessment to identify students with LEP status, the NYS Identification Test for English Language Learners (NYSITELL), and a new version of the annual assessment, the NYS English as a Second Language Achievement Test (NYSESLAT). Additionally, the Commissioner's Regulations Part 154 which govern programs for bilingual students and immigrant youth, have been revised significantly. Many of these changes will take effect this school year. The ESOL Department will review programs to ensure optimal instruction that is aligned with state expectations.

- FLMS ESOL, Social Studies, and Art collaboration with Katonah Museum of Art to create a 10-week program at the museum for students culminating with a museum visit and presentation for families
- Bilingual Home Base for newcomers at FLMS with social worker, guidance counselor, and teachers

The Bedford Central School District offers a rich array of interscholastic athletic opportunities for boys and girls. Health Education (K - 12)

Formalized health education classes are taught in grades 6, 7, and 8 at the middle school. It is the goal of the health department to create a safe and comfortable environment where students will acquire the essential knowledge and skills necessary to promote health and become responsible members of their families and communities. We envision the middle school health student becoming health literate based on the National Health Education Standards. Students will leave the middle school as critical thinkers, responsible citizens, self-directed learners and effective communicators.

National Health Education Standards:

- 1. Students will comprehend concepts related to health promotion and disease prevention.
- 2. Students will demonstrate the ability to access valid health information and health promoting products and services.
- 3. Students will demonstrate the ability to practice health-enhancing behaviors and reduce health risks.
- 4. Students will analyze the influence of culture, media, technology and other factors on health.
- 5. Students will demonstrate the ability to use interpersonal communication skills to enhance health.
- 6. Students will demonstrate the ability to use goal-setting and decision-making skills to enhance health.
- 7. Students will demonstrate the ability to advocate for personal, family, and community health.

In the high school, health education is a one semester course required by the State Education Department, usually taken in tenth grade. In the middle school, health education is a one quarter course which meets daily and is required by the State Education Department for all 7th and 8th graders. Health is also taught daily in the 6th grade for a five week period of time. Areas of study include substance abuse, mental health, tobacco/drugs, nutrition, first aid, human sexuality, family life, disease, human growth & development, CPR, decision making, and HIV/Aids education. At the elementary level, health education utilizes the topics found in the nationally renowned "Here's Looking At You" curriculum and is taught in conjunction with physical education.

Department Information

BCSD is committed to supporting the ongoing professional growth and development of its teachers, staff and administrators throughout their tenure in our district. Our approach to curriculum and instruction in the District is defined by our commitment to have a teacher in every classroom who is skilled at designing and implementing relevant, rigorous and motivating learning experiences that ensure "every student" is motivated, engaged and at the center of his/her learning, every day.

District professional development is designed to support every faculty member in our collective work towards this ideal. The department also collaborates with each school, department, and individual teachers to coordinate and support professional development opportunities across the District. All professional learning experiences are aligned with our District's <u>Teacher Practice Rubric</u>, which is based on the NYS Teaching Standards and reflect research-based best practices in effective education.

New Teacher Induction Program: New faculty members participate in a 4 year professional development induction program that includes a series of courses and workshops that insure that teachers have a strong foundation in pedagogy and educational philosophy that supports district and building goals and expectations.

Individual Professional Learning Plan: For the duration of their professional career, all BCSD faculty and staff develop individual professional learning goals each year through the APPR process and are encouraged to pursue and/or design related professional development opportunities offered both within and outside of BCSD.

Highlights and Initiatives

- Excellent teachers continually learn and reflect on what they teach (the curriculum) and the best ways to teach it (pedagogy) so every one of their students will be successful. To this end, we offer teachers a series of workshops and courses that are designed to equip teachers with an extensive 'toolkit' of strategies from which they can select when designing learning units and lessons that are well matched to their students. These workshops include: "Studying The Skillful Teacher," which is based on the book of the same name by Jon Saphier, Mary Ann Haley-Speca and Robert Gower; "Differentiated Instruction in the LATI Classroom," which emphasizes student-centered, contextualized curriculum design and is based on the work of Nancy Sulla, President of IDE, Corp.; "SIOP: Sheltered Instruction Observation Protocol," a course that emphasizes the development and planning of lessons that focus on all students' language needs.
- Education technology has been another key focus in the district. The philosophy behind this professional development has been that it's not the technology tool itself that matters, but rather the careful integration of technology to engage and support students in learning requisite content and skills. In partnership with the Technology Department, technology professional development has emphasized the use of Google applications to support student learning and communication and to build teachers' knowledge of programs, software and applications. Key components include: Technology Boot Camp, a summer mini-conference attended by 90 teachers committed to learning and thoughtfully integrating technology into their teaching practice and monthly technology seminars facilitated by the Technology and Professional Development Directors in partnership with Instructional Coaches and other teachers committed to sharing best practices.
- A burgeoning area of district professional development is in the area of innovation. The District has committed to a series of study groups, committees and conferences in support of exploring innovative teaching practices, ideas and technologies and bringing them into our classrooms and schools.
- Learning in every school is supported by dedicated administrators and teacher leaders. Instructional Coaches are
 teachers who have formally committed to supporting their colleagues as critical friends and partners. The work of the
 Instructional Coaches in each school has been instrumental in helping teachers implement district pedagogical
 initiatives. This year, Instructional Coaches provided on-going one-to-one support to colleagues and developed and
 offered unique workshops and study groups to support differentiated instruction, technology integration and studentcentered learning.

2014-2015 Highlights

- Registrations exceeded 500 for the more than 75 professional development opportunities offered by the Center, often in coordination with the Bedford Professional Development Department. Initiatives were presented through courses, workshops, study groups, and event sessions which were structured over extended periods of time. Participants had the opportunity to learn, practice what they had learned, and then reconvene to reflect upon their experiences. This afforded our staff the chance to evaluate the effect of their training on student performance and use that knowledge to inform future instruction.
- In response to an increasing number of Spanish speaking community members, several Spanish courses were made available to our staff to ensure effective communication. These courses included: Conversational Spanish, Spanish in Physical Education, and Intermediate Spanish. The response from participants was positive and reflections revealed an increased ability to impact student performance through this broadening of communication with students and families.
- The Policy Board continued to review Individual Professional Development Project applications submitted by teachers through My Learning Plan. By applying a rubric designed specifically for this purpose, members met as a whole group to evaluate each proposal to ensure it was focused on student achievement, Bedford's standards, the applicant's personal goals and self-reflection.
- The Staff Development Center used grant funds to finance the creation of Technology Advisor positions to support technology initiatives across the district.

2014-2015 Visual Arts Highlights

- Friends of Art, Music, and Education (FAME) completed its fundraising efforts and the construction of the "FAME Courtyard for the Arts and Sciences" which opened this year. The courtyard is a multi-purpose space with an outdoor classroom, a stage and seating area, sensory, rain, vegetable, and native gardens, and space for displaying student sculpture. In addition, students have access to the courtyard as an extension of the commons. The project has already enriched the educational opportunities and has enhanced the culture of the school. Many thanks to FAME for their longstanding commitment to the enrichment of the educational experience for our students.
- Through a grant-funded collaboration with the Katonah Museum, 17 middle school ESOL students had the opportunity to find their inner power and learn about Japanese culture and history through the *Lethal Beauty: Samurai Weapons and Armor* and *The Art of the Japanese Kimono* exhibitions at the Katonah Museum. After learning the history and experiencing the Japanese culture, students created their own Kimono or Samurai armor, sword, and/or helmet, now on exhibit in the Fox Lane Middle School Library.
- This year, as a pilot, the 9th grade art students at Fox Lane High School all created digital portfolios for Studio Art, Studio in Crafts and Art & Design. Portfolios are a highly effective learning and assessment tool as they allow students to set goals, document, see growth, and reflect upon their achievements over time.
- Every year, the Bruce Museum in Greenwich holds its annual juried "iCreate" exhibits for high school art students in Fairfield and Westchester counties. This year, the museum had almost 500 submissions from area high schools, from which 125 made the finals. Only 30 works were selected for the actual exhibit—four of those are from Fox Lane High School students: Junior: Stephanie Browne; Seniors: Julieta Robinowitz, Spencer Gutierrez, and Michelle Perez.
- Katonah Museum Exhibits: Fox Lane senior art students participated in the design, installation and exhibition of their artwork in the Katonah Museum for the annual Young Artists exhibit. BCSD art educators Allison Schwartz, Lauren Lamance and Heather Kranz redesigned and presented the graphic design workshop for the museum to 60 students from 32 area high schools to create the advertising campaign for the exhibit.

2015-2016 Visual Arts Initiatives

- A new instructional approach is taking hold in the art department: TAB (Teaching Artistic Behavior) treats the student as an authentic artist and provides opportunities for students to engage in authentic, meaningful, and developmentally appropriate art experiences. Many of the elementary and high school art teachers have begun to implement the approach with great success. Within the TAB approach, students are encouraged to own their work thinking and acting like artists, making their own choices, increasing self-responsibility, and communicating their ideas and intention. This approach encourages creativity, innovation, a passion for learning, and collaboration as students become more reflective and independent. This coming year, TAB will be gradually infused across the district.
- The Visual Arts Department has made a commitment to implementing individual student digital portfolios across the district as the most authentic and meaningful way to assess student growth and achievement. Much of the professional development this coming year will focus on supporting the work towards that goal.
- In a combined grant with the Katonah Museum, Fox Lane Middle School ESOL students will once again have the opportunity to experience art enrichment at the museum next fall where they will learn about the art, write about it, and create artwork inspired by the connections they make, and then present their work at the museum in an exhibit.

The goal of the Pupil Personnel Department (PPS) is to provide advocacy for students and families throughout the Bedford Central School District. The PPS Department supervises and oversees the implementation of all K-12 student support services including Response to Intervention services (RTI), 504 Accommodation Plans, home instruction and coordination of guidance and counseling services. In addition, the department also supervises and aligns District practice in the areas of attendance, discipline, student records management and student registration.

2014-2015 Highlights

- Dignity for All Students Act: (DASA): Each of our schools incorporated anti-bullying programs such as OLWEUS, the ABC Project, and/or World of Difference. In addition, we have Dignity Act coordinators designated at each school who have been trained on the implementation of our districtwide anti-bullying efforts. The PPS Department continued to support and train staff on reporting and collecting data and intervening when allegations of bullying occur.

Department Information

The Special Education Department supervises and oversees the Committee on Special Education (CSE) and Committee on Preschool Special Education (CPSE), the identification of students with disabilities, the delivery of special education services, related services and access to general education for students with disabilities. The Committee on Special Education and the Committee on Preschool Special Education assess and evaluate the educational needs of special education students and those students suspected of having a disability, and subsequently meet annually to review the educational programs of these students

The department offers a variety of programs and services to meet the differing needs of students with disabilities. This is referred to as the continuum of services. This continuum includes such programs as:

- Related services speech/language, counseling, physical therapy, occupational therapy
- Consultant teacher direct and/or indirect
- Resource Room specialized supplementary instruction
- Integrated co-teaching classes
- Special education classes may be either part-time or full-time
- Special classes at BOCES
- Private approved day schools
- Residential schools
- Home/hospital instruction

The CPSE or CSE recommends components or a combination of components on the continuum that may best meet a student's needs in what is called the Least Restrictive Environment (LRE). Students may be recommended to receive extended school year services if it is determined that the student meets the criteria for substantial regression during the summer months.

Department Information—Continued

Special Education Services
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The very premise behind the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act is to provide an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) for each student with a disability to ensure a Free Appropriate Public Education. The Bedford Central School District is committed to educating differently-abled students in the least restrictive environment which is supportive, nurturing and appropriate for them and that celebrates their unique differences by offering a continuum of programs and services that will help students continue in their quest to be lifelong learners.

Our goal is to foster growth and independence in the academic, social and emotional domains for students with disabilities; to continue to provide push-in services and supports which enable students with disabilities to be educated within the least restrictive environment; to promote a positive self-image; to work cooperatively with the staff of BOCES and private schools, which serve students placed by the CSE and CPSE; to encourage social interactions and mutual understanding between disabled and non-disabled students.

We provide a broad range of accommodations, modifications, remedial services, related services and/or special education to meet the needs of all students. Some students may require only support services while others require daily specialized instruction, special classes, or even special schools. Special education is the means by which an individualized program is designed to meet the unique needs of students with disabilities. Responsibility for special education rests with the Committee on Preschool Special Education for children ages 3 to 5 years, and the Committee on Special Education for school age students ages 5 to 21.

Self-evaluation and refinement is a guiding principle of the program, as well as the development of "state-of-the-art" programming. The Bedford Central School District is committed to providing exemplary services to all students with disabilities, and works diligently with staff, parent/guardian and students to achieve this goal.

Supports are provided from kindergarten through high school graduation or age 21. We work with the Westchester County Department of Health to support programs for children from age 3 to 5 who are classified and in need of special education services.

Special Class Program Offerings

- SAIL I and SAIL II (Structured Alternatives to Independent Learning): SAIL I is for primary age elementary students (ungraded) and SAIL II is for upper elementary students with pervasive developmental spectrum disorders including autism. The class is staffed using an 8:1:3 ratio which includes an instructional assistant and two teacher aides. Students receive speech/language, occupational therapy, and physical therapy services based on each student's IEP. Students receive social skills training twice weekly and parents receive parent training once a month throughout the school year. This integrated service provider model offers students a cohesive, comprehensive daily diet of a multiplicity of interventions to maximize each student's learning environment.
- **LEAP I and LEAP II** (Life Exploration and Academic Progress): LEAP I is for students in primary grades and LEAP II is for students in upper elementary grades with cognitive delays, communication disorders, and developmental disabilities who require a structured, skills-based curriculum. The class is staffed using a 12:1:2 ratio which includes one instructional assistant and one teacher aide. Students receive speech/language, occupational therapy, and physical therapy services

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based on each student's IEP. Students receive social skills training weekly and parents receive parent training quarterly throughout the year. In addition, an experiential component is included to help students generalize the skills beyond the classroom through community exploration activities. This integrated service provider model offers students a cohesive, comprehensive daily diet of a multiplicity of interventions to maximize each student's learning environment.

- **B.A.S.E.** (Basic Academic Skills Education): This is a multi-age class for students (ungraded, alternate assessment) whose academic and learning needs require an environment that supports activities of daily life and skill development in order to meet each student's goals and objectives towards acquiring an IEP diploma and meeting the NYS alternative learning standards. The class is staffed using a 15:1:2 ratio which includes one instructional assistant and one teacher aide. Related services are provided as per each student's IEP. In addition, an experiential component is included to help students generalize the skills beyond the classroom. This model offers students a cohesive, comprehensive daily diet of a multiplicity of interventions to maximize each student's learning environment.
- SAIL III (Structured Alternatives to Independent Learning): A program at FLMS for multi-age students (ungraded, alternate assessment) serving children with pervasive developmental spectrum disorders including autism. The class is staffed using an 8:1:3 ratio which includes one instructional assistant and two teacher aides. Related services are provided as per each student's IEP. Parents receive parent training once a month throughout the school year. This model offers students a cohesive, comprehensive daily diet of a multiplicity of interventions to maximize each student's learning environment.
- **OPT** (Opportunities for Positive Transitions): Are staffed using a 15:1:2 ratio which includes an instructional assistant and a job coach. This program offers students instruction towards mastering their goals and objectives in an effort to graduate with an IEP diploma. These students are also engaged working within the community and supported by a job coach who helps students learn to integrate into community life and job training. Transition coordination is provided and related services are IEP specific.
- SAIL IV (Structured Alternatives to Independent Learning): A program at FLHS for multi-age high school students (ungraded, alternate assessment) serving children with pervasive developmental spectrum disorders including autism. The class is staffed using an 8:1:3 ratio which includes one instructional assistant and two teacher aides. This program offers students instruction towards mastering their IEP goals and objectives in an effort to graduate with an IEP diploma. Students are engaged in work experiences and receive job training both within and outside of the high school and community based instruction is paramount. Transition coordination is provided through the program's social worker and head teacher and related services for students are IEP specific. Parents also receive parent training throughout the year.
- **KEA** (Keys to Emotional Awareness): Therapeutic Support Program helps emotionally fragile students develop coping strategies to be better able to deal with academic, social and emotional situations on a daily basis. A full time psychologist plays an integral role with students in the program. The classes are staffed using a 10:1:1 ratio which includes a special education teacher and teacher aide. Related services are provided on an individual or group basis specific to each student's IEP. Students receive resource room support within the KEA classroom and are fully mainstreamed for subject area instruction.

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- Hillside: This program services both classified and non-classified students in grades 9-12 at a site in Mt. Kisco. It offers therapeutic intervention and supports, academic instruction in all subject areas and opportunities to engage in learning and social skills development within the program and community. The staff includes content specialty teachers and special educators. The clinical team is comprised of a psychologist, social worker, and guidance counselor. There are opportunities for enrollment in a BOCES tech program and participation in after school sports, extra-curricular activities and community service is possible. Additional experiential opportunities, learning enrichment activities and job study apprenticeships compliment the array of programs and services.
- TASP (Transitional Academic Support Program): TASP is a middle school 8th grade special class language-based program focused on rigorous remediation of literacy and numeracy skills in addition to modified study of Social Studies and Science. Further, an introduction to career skills is incorporated. Students also have integrated co-teaching experiences in Social Studies and Science. Related services as per students' IEPs.
- Integrated Co-Teach: A program for students who exhibit learning and language disabilities who have the potential to access the general education curriculum and meet NYS learning standards, but exhibit a need for special education support. Co-teach classes are in a general education classroom with a general education and special education teacher to collaborate, co-teach and support these students' learning and progress. Students receive small group instruction to remediate weaknesses and address IEP goals, and some additional related services. At the secondary level, these classes are content specific.
- Consultant Teacher Model: A program for classified students to receive a minimum of two hours per week of direct and/or indirect services. Direct service provides support in the mainstream classroom by a special education teacher. Indirect service provides consultation service between the special education and mainstream teacher for a specific student's needs.

2015-2016 Initiatives

It is our belief that in working together we can better support all of our students. Toward that end, our themes for this year include *communication*, *collaboration* and *perspective*.

- We will collaborate with administration, parents, principals and students to effectively support all of our students
- We will communicate with all staff and support their continued professional growth and development that support department goals

2014-2015 Highlights

- We received a grant from the City University of New York (CUNY) to study emergent bilingual programs and how to make our environment more welcoming and improve our instruction for all students. We established an Emergent Bilingual Leadership Team and received professional development from the CUNY staff at workshops. The CUNY staff also came to BHES and provided professional development for the whole staff. The grant included approximately \$8000 in books that the school will be receiving this year. Our work with CUNY will continue this coming year.
- Lifelong Learning: BHES students and staff are encouraged to learn at all times of the day and on every day of the year. We continue to find new forms of technology to help motivate the students to read. Each school day, students filled the computer lab before school started to log onto the Reading Plus computer program. Younger students used RAZ Kids and some students practiced math using the IXL program. Over the summer, for every three books they read, students got a chance to dunk the school principal in a dunking booth at the Back to School Picnic in September. Each year, the students have read more books and participation has increased. On school vacations, students were encouraged to read thirty minutes each day. During the school year, we celebrated Dr. Seuss and Read Across America Week in early March. Community members read to the students and we hosted evening events to include parents in the celebrations.
- We hosted our Fourth Annual Science Fair this year. The experiments have become more elaborate and detailed each year.
- We hosted our first International Night where students adopted a country and created a display with facts and artifacts from that country. Over 25 countries were represented.
- Our fifth grade students helped host a "Little Doctors" Blood Drive. The students learned about the different components of blood and the importance of blood donors. They helped recruit donors and many of them helped out at the blood drive, directing donors through the stations, serving refreshments at the canteen and making a thank you card for each donor. We hope that their new knowledge will encourage them to be blood donors in the future. Each blood donation can be used for up to three different patients. This year's drive collected 51 units of blood, our most successful drive to date.

• Enrichment Programs: In partnership with our parent organization, BHESA, our school offered a wide variety of enrichment programs during the school day as well as many after school activities. Each of these programs adds to the educational experience at BHES and we are grateful to the parents for their support of these activities.

Spotlight



Walk or Bike to School Week: In conjunction with No Screen Week and PE Week, BHES also celebrates Walk or Bike to School Week each year. Students, parents and staff gather at three different locations in the morning and walk or bike to school. The walkers also help keep the community clean by picking up trash along the route on one of the days. We average about 150 walkers each day. When students arrive at the school, they sign a paper sneaker that later is used to create a trail of sneakers throughout the building. This event helps students stay healthy and get quality time with their parents before school.

Fifth Grade Art Gala: Our fifth grade students each select an artist to research. They work with the school library media specialist and their classroom teacher to write a research paper and study the artist's work. The students then work with the art teacher to create their own original work in the style of their artist. The students present their work to the students, family members and community members at an evening Art Gala where they dress as their artist and explain about their artist and their own work to the visitors. This project is supported by an art appreciation enrichment program and a field trip to the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

By working in Collaborative Learning Groups (CLG), teachers worked in groups organized by topics while each also fulfilled their own targeted goal within the topic. Topics for the CLGs included technology, Learning Active Technology Infused Classroom Structures, Student Engagement Structures, Higher Level Thinking, Learning Structures, Self-Assessment Rubrics, and Student Learning. During guided PD hours, teachers met throughout the year to share their specific work and to hear from their colleagues. The target that we kept in focus was how this professional learning impacted classroom instruction and student learning.

CARE Initiative: This year we continued to promote CARE (Cooperation, Accountability, Respect and Effort) with the students and staff. The building level Anti-Bullying Committee planned and organized activities and events to promote friendship, good choices and standing up to bullying behavior. The events included:

- Nationally acclaimed speaker and award winning author, Trudy Ludwig, who wrote and published books to help students cope with and thrive in their social world. In her books, Ms. Ludwig addresses peer aggressions and friendship issues. She is an active member of the International Anti-Bullying Association. Ms. Ludwig led school wide assemblies (K-2 & 3-5) in three of our elementary schools as school and evening presentations to staff and parents.
- This year, we also continued with Peaceful Bus meetings, Mix-It-Up Day, 5th Grade Leadership CARE meetings, and Stand Up to Bullying.

SAIL Buddies: First and fourth grade students were offered opportunities to become "buddies" to students in a self-contained special education program. This program encouraged social skills through play and games. Once a week students in both grades would visit the classrooms and engage with students in planned activities. This program has become very popular with the general education students and has a waiting list of students who are eager to participate. Next year, we hope to begin an Autism Club for fifth grade students to provide an opportunity for them to continue to foster their connections with our SAIL students and to support the program.

Professional Development School: This year Bedford Village Elementary School completed another successful year working in conjunction with Manhattanville College in the area of Professional Development. Interns, student teachers, fellows, and college students attending a site-based class made up the framework for enriched learning from kindergarten through graduate school. The work in the model becomes stronger each year as our work becomes more and more integrated.

Extra Curricular Activities

- Fundraiser for the Homeless The staff and students of BVES collected underwear and socks for homeless people of New York City.
- School Supplies to Nicaragua At the end of the school year students donated school supplies to be sent to the students in Nicaragua. These supplies are collected each year by a community member who is a former parent of our school.
- Parent/Teacher Basketball Game Parents and staff faced off in an energetic and exciting game to help BVESA raise funds for our field trips and other enrichment opportunities. Families turned out to cheer both teams on as they competed for the win.
- Chess Club Back by popular demand, K-5 students have the opportunity to join the Chess Club. Meeting once a week after school, the students receive instruction, implement new strategies and attend chess tournaments.
- **Spelling Bee** This event is a popular activity for our second through fifth grade students which draws interest from eager spellers as well as students, parents and teachers who enjoying attending and being a part of this fun evening.
- The Science Showcase Kindergarten through fifth grade students identify an interest, research information, use problem solving skills, and collect evidence to draw conclusions to support their hypothesis. "Visiting Scientists" from the school and community question and challenge the students to explain their work.

Spotlight

Courtyard Garden: In addition to the kindergarten, first, second, and SAIL students working in the Courtyard Garden, the third, fourth and fifth grade students participated in fall workshops, planting and harvesting. The garden was reconfigured by the plants making each raised bed specific to certain vegetation and flowers. Garden lessons, presented by a garden "teacher" and supported by the classroom teachers, engaged the students in all aspects of the life cycle of plants. In addition, students learned about the differences in each plant's development through activities like sorting and analyzing seeds and monitoring their growth and care. This spring, K-2 and SAIL students planted and harvested varieties of lettuce, kale, radishes, broccoli, pea pods as well as many different herbs. Each set of workshops contained developmentally appropriate plants and activities which were aligned with the students' respective science and social studies curriculum.

2014-2015 Highlights

- **Kwame Alexander, Newbery Award Winning Author, Visits MKES:** In what has become an annual tradition, our fifth grade Roary Book Club held a luncheon to recognize the winner of the Roary Award, given to the author of the book the children felt was the best out of the Newbery Award nominees. This year, the award was presented to Kwame Alexander, author of <u>Crossover</u>. We were fortunate enough to also have Mr. Alexander visit our school and speak to all 3rd-5th graders about his experiences as an author. He then honored us by attending the Roary luncheon in person to accept his Roary Award and sign copies of his book. This was an experience none of our 5th grade Roary Committee members will soon forget.
- Mount Kisco Teachers Present at National Conferences: The teachers at Mount Kisco Elementary take their professional growth seriously, participating in professional study groups, book studies, workshops and presenting at faculty meetings and conferences. This year, our teachers took their work on the road, presenting at national conferences on mathematics and professional development. Tiered teachers Pat Aris and Dan Caffrey presented their Number Gym early intervention program at the Association of Mathematics Teachers of New York State conference in Rochester, NY in November. They followed this with an encore performance at the National Council for Teachers of Mathematics conference in Boston, MA in the spring. Speech and Language teacher, Maureen Brown Warren presented at a conference called "Accelerating Excellence," the 17th National Symposium on Teacher Induction, sponsored by the New Teacher Center. Ms. Brown Warren co-presented with Drew Patrick in a session entitled, "Teacher Induction: Years 1-3 and 4-30." The session outlined the framework used in Bedford for teacher induction, including components for years 1-3 and learning activities for years 4 and beyond. Finally, 3rd grade teachers Cheryl Foy and Chris Goodrow, along with Loretta Butler and Stacey Haynsworth, presented a new model of professional development at the National Professional Development School Conference in Atlanta, GA. Their presentation captured their work as a part of Professional Development Schools, integrating classroom experiences for training teachers with applied learning in the classroom.
- Mount Kisco Community Garden Connects with Food Pantry: Through the generosity of our parent organization, paired with donations from various community organizations, the children of Mount Kisco Elementary School have had the opportunity to extend their learning beyond the classroom walls with a hands-on experience in our community garden. Students experienced the process of growing fruits and vegetables from planting seeds in the spring to harvest in the summer and fall. This year our 5th grade students were able to take this experience one step further. After harvesting vegetables from the garden they took their harvest to the Mount Kisco Interfaith Food Pantry and saw firsthand how their hard work benefits members of the Mount Kisco community. While there, students learned a little about the operation of this facility that serves more than 250 families in and around Mount Kisco, and learned that even small gestures like this can make a huge difference.

- School Psychologists Bring Unique Learning Opportunities to Our Students: Our school psychologists have brought many unique and innovative programs into our schools. This year Melanie Gilbert brought animals and children together to create the opportunity for a unique relationship that was utilized as a catalyst for reaching therapeutic goals. Animals have a unique ability to create an environment that is intrinsically therapeutic and beneficial in socialization, recreation, and the reduction of stress. In addition, animals can teach us in many ways about our own character with their organic acceptance and lack of judgment. This work was especially exciting as it allowed students to open up, engage, and laugh. Students who were at times guarded and withdrawn were able to open up about their feelings and life stressors. Rebecca Harding worked with students to create their own video to encourage positive social interaction. After studying the Kid President video, "20 Things We Should Say More Often," with a group of fourth grade students, they shared the video with their entire class, then created their own video- "20 Things MKES Should Say More Often." The project facilitated weekly discussions of social topics, encouraged pro-social thinking, and benefitted all students through collaborative work.
- **Dual Language Bilingual Education Completes First Year:** After the successful implementation of the Enhanced Model in kindergarten during the 2013-2014 school year, which provided students with literacy instruction in their home language along with Spanish language enrichment through LOTE, the program was expanded to include first grade during the 2014-2015 school year. Students participating in the program received their instruction in English and Spanish on alternating days. Throughout the year, parents were invited to information sessions with teachers and administrators. This program has set students on a course toward a diploma with a seal of bi-literacy.
- **Problem-Based Learning Focus on Student Inquiry:** Over the past two years, Mount Kisco teachers have strived to expand their use of problem-based learning, a student-centered technique in which students learn about a subject through the experience of creating a problem. Our 4th and 5th grade students participated in experiences centered around Simple Machines and Catapults, respectively. This was the second year for each of these experiences. New initiatives this year included a kindergarten unit on the 5 senses, which encouraged the use of scientific vocabulary while exploring materials through each of the senses, and a 3rd grade unit on wind energy, which allowed children to use the scientific method to determine the ideal blade shape to generate the maximum amount of energy. We look forward to expanding problem-based learning to 1st and 2nd grades next year.
- Daily 5 Protocol: What started out as a small group of teachers exploring a topic of interest soon caught on with
 many teachers and became a significant initiative to enhance literacy instruction this year. The Daily 5 Protocol is a
 framework for structuring literacy time so students develop lifelong habits of reading, writing and working
 independently. It incorporates many principles of the Learner Active Technology-infused Classroom and resulted in
 students gaining ownership of parts of their learning, resulting in increased independence and the freedom to be selfdirected learners.

2015-2016 Initiative

Focus on Literacy: At the core of the elementary experience lies the goal of developing and enhancing literacy for all of our students. With this goal in mind, we have been working to improve our use of data to inform instruction while developing instructional strategies to facilitate this work. We are in the midst of a two-year pilot implementation of the Fountas & Pinnell Benchmark Assessment System, which seamlessly links assessment to instruction along *The Continuum of Literacy Learning*, accurately identifying each student's instructional level. In the second year of implementation, we will be working to fine-tune our schedule of assessment and continue to examine student results to tailor instruction to individual needs. Through the utilization of the Daily 5 Protocol, a framework for structuring literacy time so students develop lifelong habits of reading, writing and working independently, we will continue to encourage student independence while gaining more structured time for small group guided instruction. In addition, we will be utilizing resources from the Lucy Calkins Common Core Writing Units to strengthen our ability to meet the demands of the Common Core in writing. We will also continue the implementation of the CAPE organizer in grades 2-5 to facilitate our students' ability to respond to literature accurately and with sufficient detail. Finally, through a restructuring of our core intervention block, our 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students will have the opportunity to work for small blocks of time in heterogeneous literacy groups to further develop and enrich their literacy experience.

2014-2015 Highlights

- School-wide implementation of Character Education program: core values, common courtesies, antibullying themes connected to literature. Students listened to and created books that supported the character
 education themes and connected them to the visual arts. Awarded National and International Best Practices
 in Character Education for Omode Parent Workshops and Friendship Groups. Student Character Education
 Committee (Kiit Committee "Kids in it together." Making West Patent even better!) met twice a month
 to brainstorm and discuss character education, write core values announcements, and create a visual
 culture.
- School-wide enrichment was implemented by the tiered support teachers in collaboration with special area teachers. Students in various grades were able to choose units of study based on interest. Students were able to cycle through various project based learning opportunities throughout the year.
- Close collaboration with West Patent Elementary School Association and Aramark Food Service to foster
 healthy life styles. A focus on a healthy body with a healthy mind. Collaboration with the Wellness
 Committee and the Garden Committee resulted in student participation in the learning gardens. Harvests of

2015-2016 Initiatives

- Continue community outreach, education and communication regarding the renovation at West Patent Elementary School. Detailed planning for improving the physical environment as the school undergoes a renovation project funded by a bond.
- Ongoing curricular work will continue in aligning and implementing the new core curriculum standards. Teachers will be focusing on aligning their units of study with the NYS Common Core Standards. Teachers will continue to implement the Math in Focus program as well as the Journey's literacy program in grades K -5. Work will continue to use an interdisciplinary approach to make learning "real" for students. The focus on authentic units of study across all grade levels will be a priority. Various tools that are available to teachers including Reading Plus, assessments data from various sources including AIMSweb, other software applications and access to the IDE portal support these efforts for differentiation. Implementation of new APPR teacher supervision regulations will continue. Work on creating a sustainable curriculum will find a renewed effort; lessons will reflect the needs of the school population.
- Staff development within the school community will be focused on a sharing of best practices and learning more about learner active technology infused learning with the focus on implementing the structures and strategies of the LATI classroom, developing authentic learning units and critical thinking skills; continue working at creating summative assessments for units of study in all content areas; continue the use of data to inform instruction and curricular changes. Increasing the level of work: more rigor, higher level thinking with problem solving will be a focus of professional development. The work of the school based inquiry team will lead the staff in collecting and analyzing data for instructional use. Systematize data collection.
- Continue the use of the character education initiative via children's literature and suggested lessons that accompany the themes throughout the school year with the support of WPESA. A wide variety of assemblies complement the work. The Peer Buddy Program continues to grow giving opportunities for all students to interact. Continue the work of the Climate Action Committee and expand on parent workshops. The Kiit Committee (Student Character Education Committee) will continue to meet and focus on service learning and creating a visual culture.
- Maximize the time of personnel who work with small and flexible groups across the spectrum of abilities.
 Continue the work begun last year in the school-wide enrichment program so that more students get a chance to participate in venues such as: The Jason Project, Makerspace, Math Olympiad, Continental Math, Word Masters, enrichment experiences within the grade level, work with the tiered support teachers, classroom teachers, special area teachers, library media specialist, ECT, and principal.

The spotlight at West Patent Elementary School has always been and will continue to be on the students! The whole student! While learning to read, write and compute are skills that every child must acquire, being a productive and contributing member of society is a trait that is fostered by all at WPES. West Patent Elementary School's efforts with the character education program have been to have students focus their energies outward. Students

2014 - 2015 Highlights

- The English department continued their work on student portfolios, both as a writing/revision process and a common assessment. This work was impacted through the expansion of the technology pilot to more teachers within the department to support online/ongoing electronic portfolios and through the benchmarking of student writing to create anchor papers that will be available to members of the Fox Lane/Bedford community. During the upcoming year, the department will expand its PADI work throughout all grades in FLMS.
- In the ESOL department, teachers worked to prepare for shifts in delivery of services as a result of new regulations, embarked on a deeper study of literacy learning for the ESOL student, created new SIOP partnerships, and enhanced engagement and connections with families and community resources.
- This year the Physical Education and Health departments continued to focus on student engagement, literacy and student responsibility for learning. Changes made included: S.M.A.R.T goals were introduced into physical education units of study; AVID strategies were infused into all Health classes. All teachers participated in "discipline specific" training used to develop common language and improve communication with our ESOL students. The staff also piloted two new units of study, Snowshoeing and Rugby, and plan to continue to develop each unit as they move forward with the 2015 -16 school year. Bedford Magazine highlighted the work of our APE teacher, Jeff Alviti, and his use of pet therapy with his students.
- The 6-12 Science department focused on scientific inquiry and the application of knowledge and thinking skills. During 2014-2015, a Science Advisory Committee comprised of middle and high school Science teachers was created to examine the new NextGen Science Standards and to align them to the department's guiding principles of scientific literacy, responsible citizenship, inquiry and critical thinking. Sixth and seventh grade Science teachers participated in the Teaching is a Core Grant for developing and implementing performance-based assessments and analyzing student work. In response to this work, an examination of the current model and sequence of MS/HS curricular offerings was begun in order to ensure a continuum of learning. In addition, several 6-12 department members were identified to participate in a district-wide Innovation Technology and Spaces Committee which evolved into a virtual consultancy through the Association of American School Administrators (AASA). For a second year, the alignment of pre-engineering and Project Lead the Way (PLTW) curriculum and the middle school technology curriculum was also an area of focus.

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- The 6-12 Social Studies department analyzed existing curriculum to compare and contrast it to the historical thinking skills and themes and practices of the new Social Studies curriculum. In addition, performance-based assessments were created by each grade level six to twelve. Teachers met in like grade level groups to create, administer and analyze student results and reflections using a protocol. All students were given the assessments, and student work was collected. Students' work, assessments and reflections were shared at the May department meeting using a deep-thinking protocol to look at student work.
- The first FLMS AVID cohort was introduced during the 2014-2015 school year. Seventh grade AVID students participated in a daily AVID elective class taught by an AVID teacher and attended weekly tutorology sessions and counseling forums. Students also participated in transition opportunities with FLHS AVID students. School wide professional development opportunities reflected an attention to particular AVID strategies and were led by the FLMS site team. The 2015-2016 school year will see the addition of another AVID cohort of students.
- As part of our ongoing efforts to keep all of our students safe in cyberspace, Allyson Pereira visited all eighth grade students to speak about her experiences with sexting and cyberbullying. Ms. Pereira has been featured on MTV: Sexting in America, The View, HLN, Good Morning America, Fox News, MTV: Disconnected Aftershow, and Dr. Drew. She has also been traveling to middle and high schools speaking to kids about the dangers of sexting and the repercussions of bullying. She has also worked with MTV's A Thin Line as a member of their Street Team. (She is one of thirteen appointed.) In doing so, she has met many teenagers who claimed to have been considering suicide until hearing her story. Most recently, Ms. Pereira helped change New Jersey's sexting laws to get rid of the sex offender status and is currently working to change laws nationwide. She was recognized for her work from the New Jersey State House Assembly and awarded: "Rising Young Woman of Change." She was also invited to The White House to speak about bullying. She is currently writing a book about her struggles with sexting and bullying.
- Made With Code Workshop FLMS girls learned how to use computer coding to pursue their interests from art to sports to fashion to medicine to science, and everything in between.
- Holocaust Remembrance Concert The Eighth Grade Chorus participated in a National Holocaust Day of Remembrance concert. The Chorus presented excerpts from "Brundibar," a children's opera performed many times in the Theresienstadt camp during the Nazi occupation of Czechoslovakia. The students learned about the role of music and musicians in the camps, and the ways that we honor their memories today by performing music that was used as propaganda, or declared "degenerate" or forbidden by the Nazi regime.
- During extended Homebase, eighth graders were introduced to the Peer Power Program. Current high school juniors were supervised by the clinical team to become peer mentors to eighth graders in order to promote greater independence in navigating the transition to high school life. A select group of current high school juniors join eighth graders in large group activities, such as the ropes course and lunchtime socials, during the spring of eighth grade. At the end of the year, juniors were paired with current eighth grade students. The student pairs will meet on an individual basis during the first semester of freshman year to continue the transition.
- Digital Citizenship Throughout the year the Digital Citizenship Committee worked on developing an electronic use policy that reflects the changing face of technology tools and applications. The committee reviewed the current policy, researched other middle school policies and discussed the use of technology at Fox Lane Middle School. The committee gathered and analyzed information from parents and students as part of their year-long study.
- Bow Tie Fridays FLMS adopted the symbol of a bowtie to symbolize taking a stand against bullying. Through weekly class meetings, students participated in character education lessons grounded in the OLWEUS Anti-Bullying Program. This work underscored a school-wide commitment to building a better Fox Lane Middle School Community.

2015-2016 Initiatives

- Fox Lane Middle School's proactive approach to student discipline is grounded in the principles of Positive Behavioral Intervention Systems (PBIS). PBIS is a research validated and balanced approach to discipline which uses a comprehensive system for defining, teaching and supporting appropriate student behavior. At the onset of the 2015-2016 school year, we will build upon our existing work in this area by launching the *OLWEUS* bullying prevention program. Through homebase advisory class meetings, grade and house town meetings, as well as classroom instruction, students will continue to gain knowledge of and abide by our guiding tenets of Cooperation, Accountability, Respect, and Effort. An extension of this work is the development of our school based *Bow Tie for a Cause Upstander Program* modeled after the national program. The FLMS bow tie, designed by students, represents a commitment to be an upstander. The Bow Tie will be produced this summer and delivered to Fox Lane this September as part of the official launch of the OLWEUS program. Our hope is that every member of the FLMS community and beyond will embrace the upstander bow tie and proudly wear it on designated days to symbolize the importance of a positive, supportive and Up-Standing Community.
- The Capital Plan process will take a critical next step as we begin the next phase of the design process. By transforming our learning environment to support 21st century learning, and using both current and potential partnerships to support us in this process, we will begin to create the middle school of the future both literally and figuratively.
- Professional development experiences will be developed with a PDS lens using the principles of learner active technology infused classrooms, and will integrate learning in the areas of school wide literacy, technology, Response to Intervention and PBIS.
- Communication with parents will be increased using varied technology tools and resources.
- Phase three of the FLMS laptop initiative will facilitate increased access to technology across the campus and best practices for using Google Apps in the classroom will be identified.
- Transition experiences for middle school students will be redesigned beginning with a school wide First-day 2.0.

Spotlight

Fox Lane Middle School implemented AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) with its first student cohort during the 2014-2015 school year. AVID is a globally recognized philosophy which supports students through advanced coursework by using specific strategies, social support models, programs, mentorship and tutorials to prepare students for success in high school, college and a career. This year, a group of seventh grade students will join the existing FLHS cohorts of students who have already achieved marked success. In addition, AVID's proven instructional practices and methodologies will further enhance existing school wide professional development opportunities.

2014-2015 Highlights

- FLHS is proud to have been selected as a 2014-15 School of Opportunity by the National Education Policy Center based at the University of Colorado, Boulder. Our Schools of Opportunity Silver Recognition is a result of documented success in implementing practices that distinguish our school as committed to closing opportunity gaps, as set forth in the Closing the Opportunity Gap book. Specifically, schools that receive this prestigious honor reflect efforts towards:
 - Reducing the opportunity gap
 - ♦ Improvements in closing gaps in student learning
 - ♦ An equitable enrollment of students with IEPs
 - ♦ 10% or more students eligible for free or reduced priced meals
 - ♦ Equity of student participation in challenging courses
 - ♦ Evidence of evenhanded and non-exclusionary disciplinary practices
 - Descriptions of services and practices that support the physical and emotional safety of students
- We opened the 2014-2015 school year with a new schedule. Classes are now meeting for 55 minutes, instead of 40 minutes. This change is in our efforts to realize our teaching and learning goals:
 - ♦ A higher level of engagement for a maximum amount of time
 - ♦ Increasing self-responsibility for learning
 - ♦ Academically rigorous, cognitively challenging, higher order tasks
- Our new schedule has classes meeting 4 out of 5 days a week. Many students shared that they appreciated the flexibility provided by the new schedule, as it prepares them for college and provides an opportunity to focus learning of time management skills. A "special" function of the new schedule is a monthly collaborative lunch period of 70 minutes. This is a time for teachers to work with colleagues on curriculum development and course planning, while students are able to come together as a whole school, lunch with friends, and participate in a variety of specially planned community activities during that extended time.
- This year we changed our Advisory structure. Advisories consist of small groups (10-12 students) meeting periodically with one staff member. The groups are grade level based and the "advisor" might be a teacher, a member of the support staff or an administrator. The purpose of the Advisory program is to provide an opportunity for students to connect with a small group of peers and an adult in the building in a non-academic setting over the course of their four years at Fox Lane.
- Fox Lane High School and the Bedford Central School District were named by the College Board for making the 4th Annual AP Honor Roll in 2013-2014. This is recognition for our school's commitment to expanding opportunity and improving performance for Advanced Placement students. We are proud to be recognized for giving access to more students by encouraging them to take Advanced Placement and "honors" level courses, while maintaining outstanding results on the most rigorous assessments. We continue our efforts and commitment to this work as essential to our commitment to Closing the Achievement Gap. A faculty study group met this year to engage in our own research on Closing the Achievement Gap and this continued to be one of our school-wide goals with the full faculty during the 2014-2015 school year.
- During the 2013-2014 school year, we introduced a new model of administrative leadership, with each of our two Assistant Principals responsible for two grades. In September, 2014, we welcomed Mr. Martinez, as our new Assistant Principal, and thus the Assistant Principal for the Classes of 2016 and 2018. Ms. Piquero served as the Assistant Principal for the Classes of 2015 and 2017. Ms. Piquero will now become the Assistant Principal working most closely with the Class of 2019 (or incoming 9th graders). This is part of our commitment to *connections*, as the Assistant Principals each get to know the students and families in their grades, and as they work more closely with the staff serving those students.

2014-2015 Highlights (continued)

- This year, we held our ribbon cutting ceremony and officially opened our new "state of the art" courtyard, the FAME Courtyard for Arts and Sciences, attached to our SALT gallery and the Commons. We were excited to be able to host art exhibits with the work of our students, faculty and guest artists, as well as using this space as an outdoor classroom, as a space for students and staff to engage in reflection, and for smaller outdoor performances and celebrations. This new courtyard is thanks to the substantial fundraising efforts of FAME (Friends of Art, Music and Education).
- We have introduced a sequence of courses, beginning either in the middle school or as early as freshman year at Fox Lane High School, for students interested in engineering. Project Lead the Way's (PLTW) Pathway To Engineering (PTE) program is a sequence of courses, which follows a proven hands-on, real-world problem-solving approach to learning. PLTW sets the highest standards for rigorous, focused and engaging study, developing students' innovative, collaborative, critical-thinking and problem-solving skills. PTE courses are designed to appeal to all students and help them make the critical connections between STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) principles and solving the real challenges in our communities and the world.
- Each year, our ESOL program presents a "Career Day," in which we welcome to Fox Lane High School a number of highly accomplished professionals from the larger community who share their personal experiences and professional successes with ESOL students. We hosted this program again this spring.
- In 2011-2012, we welcomed two exchange students from China to our school and community. In 2012-2013, Fox Lane High School hosted a delegation of students to Fox Lane from our new "sister-schools" in Beijing. In April, 2014, Fox Lane sent our first group of students to China where they lived with host families, took classes at our sister schools in Beijing and Shanghai, and visited historical and cultural sites. While we did not send a delegation of students to China during the 2014-2015 school year, we did welcome a delegation from our sister school to Bedford and Fox Lane in February. Host families welcomed these students from China into their homes, and students attended classes with our students at FLHS. We will continue to strengthen this collaborative endeavor with our sister schools in China.

2015-2016 Initiatives

- Our school-wide theme for the 2015-2016 school year is a renewed commitment to celebrating our school's rich diversity and understanding differences and treating all members of our school community with respect. We are planning student led workshops, as a result of some training of student leaders that we began last year, a number of school assemblies and special programs, and professional development for our teachers and support staff. We are looking forward to a highly spirited Multicultural Week of activities in the spring and activities provided by our school's GSA.
- Our Advisory program will be given greater attention this year, with more frequent meetings. Our Advisory program was developed to provide students and staff an opportunity to connect on a small group level, with advisories of no more than 12 students and one staff member meeting to discuss a variety of issues, some identified schoolwide and some chosen by the particular group. Advisories will continue to be grade level based and will stay together for each student's four year experience at Fox Lane.
- Fox Lane High School is proud to have been selected as one of 78 schools from across the U.S. to participate the Partnership for Equal Opportunity Schools. This is the third year of this program as part of the AP/IB Equity and Excellence Project, the most rigorous study to date on the impact of Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) on college completion for low-income students and students of color. We are the ONLY school in NY selected at this phase of this project. The project's effectiveness is being evaluated by an assistant professor of economics and public affairs at Princeton University and faculty research fellow at the Education Innovation Laboratory at Harvard University. The districts selected are dedicated to enabling greater access to and success in Advanced Placement courses.

2015-2016 Initiatives (continued)

- During the 2012-2013 school year, we introduced a new program, AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination), an internationally recognized, college readiness system that is designed to increase school-wide learning and performance. Our initial cohort included a number of accepted freshmen and a team of Fox Lane personnel. This summer we extended the number of personnel who all participated in an extensive training in Philadelphia. Our first cohort of 9th graders are now in the 12th grade cohort. In September, we will welcome our fourth cohort, bringing the total number of students in this program to more than 100. All high school teachers are being taught the successful strategies and instructional practices that would benefit not only the AVID students, but all students. Many students from last year's group have taken their first AP course, also one of the AVID goals. All AVID students visit colleges, meet with college representatives and aspire to take our most rigorous academic program at Fox Lane. FLMS now has two AVID cohorts as well. We are excited about working with our seniors, our first cohort in AVID, to begin the college admissions process.
- Students in our Computer Science club have developed an app for smartphones which they will introduce to our student body in the fall. This app will allow students easy access to their own schedules, as well as all school announcements and calendar events.
- This year, we will be asking our students, teachers and parent community to provide feedback to our school leadership through participation in surveys. We're looking for feedback on the current experiences of our students as well as assistance in helping us identify and articulate future goals. We will also be establishing a committee of students, staff and parents this year to help us develop these surveys and provide school-based leadership representing all constituencies.
- This spring, we look forward to once again hosting the regional College Fair, where we anticipate several hundred college, university and work-place representatives, as well as a rich menu of workshop choices for students and parents from Fox Lane and around the region.
- In 2013-2014, our World Languages Department participated in an extensive self-study through our work with the Tri-States Consortium. The result of the self-study and the Tri-States visit that followed was a series of commendations and recommendations for the department, 6-12, to consider. The visiting committee will return to our district this year to guide us through a discussion of our progress in responding to their recommendations and the work the department hopes to consider moving forward.
- Last spring, we "piloted" school-wide use of the Parent Portal to improve home/school communications. We
 will continue to gather feedback from staff, parents and students, and guidelines for all school use will be developed for the 2015-2016 school year.
- With FLHSA and a rich alumni network, we are planning a program to recognize the accomplishments of Fox Lane High School alumni. We will be bringing together a committee of staff, students, parents, former staff members, and alumni, to develop the guidelines for the identification, selection and recognition of a number of notable alumni each spring. Our hope is to recognize our first group in the spring of 2016.

Additional Activities

- A comprehensive athletic program of 17 fall, 14 winter and 12 spring sports teams meets the needs of students who enjoy competition at interscholastic competitions.
- In addition to the above clubs and activities which enrich our rigorous curriculum, we offer school-wide activities, such as: Spirit Week, Wellness Day, Multicultural Week, Lip Sync and the student/faculty talent show.
- Our Tech Center offers a unique opportunity to gain employable skills, and in some cases college credits, while students are in high school. Training and skill development is accomplished on the latest equipment including computer literacy for each occupational area. This opportunity is available in over 35 different occupational areas for any high school student. Students may come to the Tech Center for part of the school day and still be able to take required courses at the high school. Students are also able to participate in extra curricular activities, including athletics at the high school. Attending the Tech Center enables students to receive not only the latest technical training, but also grants them three credits per school year. Students should know that poor attendance could result in removal from the Tech Center.
