FLHS Application Supports

- Group Guidance Very Important!
 - Every week during Q1 on E and 5 days for seniors
 - Will cover all components of process
 - Students have a packet of handouts and Google Classroom
- Individual Meetings
 - As needed to review applications, essays, resumes, mock interviews, etc.
- Family Meetings
 - Optional for families this fall via Google Meet, phone, or in person
 - Additionally a lot of information for families can be found on our website and in our Fall Newsletter which will be sent out shortly
- Writing Center for Essays
 - For students who want to work with an English teacher on their essay



Deadline Types

- Early Decision "ED" / Early Decision II "ED2"
 - Binding Agreement
 - Most ED I are 11/1 or 11/15
- Restricted Early Action "REA" / Single Choice EA
 - Read each REA policy carefully!
 - REA is not very common
- Early Action "EA" / Priority
 - \circ Can be as early as 10/15 and as late as December (most are in November)
 - Some schools have priority scholarship and/or special program deadlines
- > Rolling / Closing Deadline
 - Do as early as possible
- Regular Decision "RD"
 - Many are January 1st



Types of Applications

The Common Application (NAVIANCE CONNECTED)

- ➤ 1000+ colleges use the Common App
- > ALL students must create a <u>Common Application</u> account
- > Always use Common App if there is a choice
- Most widely used application for students



The SUNY Application

Most SUNY Colleges are now on the Common Application; use the Common App if there is a choice

The Coalition Application

> 150+ schools also use the Coalition Application as an application choice; use the Common Application if there is a choice


Institutional Application

Found on individual school's websites for all colleges who don't subscribe to the Common Application or the Coalition Application

Application Components

The Transcript

- The transcript still is the key part of any college application
- 1st & 2nd Q report cards are sent to ALL colleges
- Transcript requests are made through Naviance at least 3 weeks prior to first deadline
- Additional requests can be added but it is safest to place transcript requests 3 weeks prior to the deadline



SAT and ACT

➤ College Board / SAT

> <u>ACT</u>

- Most substantially changed part of the process due to COVID. MOST schools are now test optional; important to check each school's website for their policy on Standardized Testing
- Students are encouraged to submit test scores if they are within a schools mid-50% and/or if their test scores are stronger than a student's academic grades
- If a student is using scores, students are responsible for sending either **official scores OR self-reported scores** to colleges (<u>List of Colleges That Allow Self</u> <u>Reporting</u>)
 - Official test scores are sent directly from College Board or ACTs website
- Students are responsible for knowing each school's testing requirements and delivery options



College Essays

- Main Common App Essay
- Optional: Common App COVID and additional information short answers
- Supplemental essay are in "My Colleges" Section of the Common App
- Essay might be different for Coalition and/or non-Common App schools
- English teacher can provide support on the development of the college essays (after-school help, Writing Center, and help on day of PSATs)



Resume / Activity Sheet

What to include...

- Honors and Awards
- Clubs and Activities
- Outside Activities
- Community Service
- Work Experience
- > Athletics
- Hobbies and Interests



- Quality over quantity
- Authentic representation of how students spend their free time
- Student should send counselors a copy (ideally 3 weeks prior to first deadline)
- Activities must be reported on Common App; a separate resume is optional
- A completed resume is required for our local scholarship application due in February

Teacher Recommendations

How Many?

- Most colleges require 0-2
- Counselor Recommendation is separate
- Supplemental Recommendations are separate and are not required (process done through Common App and not through Naviance)

Process

- Speak with teacher
- Add teacher to Naviance at least three weeks prior to first deadline (teachers have until deadline to submit)
- Students do not need to wait for teacher recommendations to submit application
- Follow up with Thank You note to teacher



Counselor Recommendations

- Counselor writes for every senior
- Counselor Recommendation is requested by student completing a transcript request in Naviance
- Counselor Recommendation presents a more <u>holistic</u> view of student vs. Teacher Recommendation presents a <u>classroom</u> view of student
- Similar to teacher recommendations counselors have until deadline to submit, and order of submission does not matter (students should submit when ready)
- In order for Counselors to provide the best letter of recommendation possible:
 - Students: Complete the Questionnaire via email or Docs
 - Parents: Complete the Brag Sheet via email



FERPA Waiver

- Before we can send out transcripts & letters of recommendation students must:
 - (1) authorize FLHS to release records (ie. transcript, letters, etc.) to the colleges they are applying to, &
 - (2) choose whether or not to waive their FERPA rights regarding their letters of recommendation
- While students will complete an electronic FERPA on the Common App, parents/guardians must also sign a paper FERPA waiver. If not already completed, please sign the waiver included in your child's Group Guidance packet
- > No documents will be sent from FLHS before the waiver is completed
- Colleges recommend that students "waive" their rights for letters of recommendation



Financial Aid: Need-Based Aid

PARENT RESPONSIBILITY!!!



- > FAFSA (all schools; new changes this year for FAFSA!)
- CSS/PROFILE (Created by College Board; not all colleges require the CSS/PROFILE)
- Check each college's website for deadlines and to see what's required
- Net-Price Calculator
- Our recommendation: fill out forms in October/December

FAFSA

- https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa
- FAFSA New date this year: December
- Required by ALL schools if applying for need-based financial aid
- Based on 2022 Tax Year
- New Rules this year
- Early Decision: FAFSA should be completed in early December new deadline might impact the timeliness of some ED packages
- Make sure you are filling out the FAFSA for 2024-25
- You need to complete FAFSA each year
- The FAFSA is free (do not pay a 3rd party!)
- FAFSA will connect you to the TAP (NY State Aid) application



CSS/PROFILE





- https://cssprofile.collegeboard.org/
- ➤ Many private colleges and a few public use CSS PROFILE
- CSS Profile Participating Institutions and Programs
- CSS/PROFILE still opens on October 1st
- Deeper dive into financial assets, private business, properties, etc.
- Many schools will also require non-custodial parent information through Profile
- Uses student's College Board account log in

Financial Aid: Merit-Based Aid

- Merit Scholarships through college
 - Most merit money comes directly from individual colleges
 - Some are automatically considered
 - Some require an additional application
 - Some have a priority deadline requirement
 - Student or Parent should review on each school's website
- Increase "Safety" schools to increase potential scholarship opportunities
- Local Scholarship Packet available mid-Winter
- Scholarship Searches
 - www.fastweb.com or www.goingmerry.com or through other searches



NY State Financial Aid Opportunities

(1) Excelsior Program (Public NY Colleges)

- *Eligibility*: Must be a resident of NYS; have a combined federal adjusted gross income of \$125,000 or less; be pursuing an undergraduate degree at a NYS public college.
- Award Amount: Up to the resident tuition rate charged by SUNY or CUNY; for tuition only and does not apply to Room and Board.

(2) NY STEM Incentive Program (Public and Private NY Colleges)

- *Eligibility:* Must be a NYS resident; be enrolled full time at a <u>public</u> or <u>private</u> college located in NYS; be ranked in the top 10 percent of their graduating class; be matriculated in an approved undergraduate program leading to a degree in STEM. There is no income restriction on the STEM Incentive Program.
- Award Amount: Up to the annual SUNY tuition charged to NYS residents.

(3) Enhanced Tuition Award (Private NY Colleges - the private equivalent to Excelsion)

- *Eligibility*: Must be a resident of NYS; have a combined federal adjusted gross income of \$125,000 or less; be pursuing an undergraduate degree at a <u>participating private colleges</u> located in NYS.
- Award Amount: Recipients will generally receive \$6,000 through a combination of their TAP award, ETA award and a match from their private college.

(4) DREAM Act

- *Eligibility*: gives <u>undocumented</u> students access to NYS administered grants and scholarships that support their higher education cost.
- Award Amount: Varies

Naviance Highlights



- College list should be kept up to date in Naviance
- All transcript requests and letter of recommendation requests are processed through Naviance
- Students can track transcript and letter progress through Naviance
- Students should report admissions decisions through Naviance
- Scattergrams and "Compare Me" data, specific to FLHS, is housed in Naviance; averages in the system are unweighted and include testing scores, even if student applied test optional
- New this year: Students will be asked to specify whether or not they are applying with test scores

COVID Changes

- COLLEGE ADMISSIONS & COVID-19
- Most colleges were test optional the last few years and many have continued this policy for this year
- Many improved virtual opportunities to visit, interview, and demonstrate interest
- Essay prompt on Common App allows students to share how pandemic has impacted them (optional - and not done by most students unless impact was substantial)
- Campus Visits: In-person still recommended when possible
- At highly selective colleges application numbers skyrocketed, and continue to climb, and test averages have increased due to test optional policies

Demonstrated Interest

- > FLHS College Visits
 - All throughout October, listed in Naviance
- > Attend Online Events (virtual tours, information sessions, etc.)
- Visit Campuses (tours and information sessions)
- College Fairs
- > Interviews
 - Some virtual, some in person, look into requirements per school
 - The Bedford Foundation is running a mock interview event 10/16-10/19 for those who are interested! (email sent out this week)
- Open and read emails from colleges
- Demonstrated Interest is important for many schools!!!
